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History of the Rice Planters

Rice Planters Begins

Some of the Carolinas' best amateur golfers assemble at Snee Farm Golf Club today for the start of the 72-hole first annual Rice Planters Invitational Golf Tournament.

North Carolina amateur champ David Canipe of Fayetteville, veteran Bill Harvey of Jamestown, N.C., South Carolina Match Play champion David Bennett of Florence and Snee Farm's own Dick Horne rate as the tournament favorites, but there are several others who may emerge as titlist.

Those include Bubba Hightower of Moncks Corner, David Nexsen of Kingstree, Maury Finkelstein of Charleston, Tommy Coulson of Lexington, and Bill Lewis of Florence.

Canipe, a University of Georgia student, won the N.C. Amateur by a whopping margin. He played outstanding golf all summer, and is

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one of the top players for Georgia, which has one of the South's better golf teams.

Harvey also has a Carolina amateur title to his credit this year - the Carolina Amateur crown. Runnerup in the Country Club of Charleston's Azalea tournament this spring, Harvey also finished second in Pinehurst's North and South tournament, where he lost in the finals to Mike Ford.

Florence's Bennett and Lewis, both from Florence Country Club, probably will both be contenders in the Rice Planters, Bennett won the first annual S.C. Match Play title early in the summer, while Lewis, the brother of professional Jack Lewis, finished tied for third in the S.C. Amateur tournament in August.

Area hopes will once again be pinned on Horne, Hightower, and Finkelstein. Hightower is taking time off from his studies at the University of South Carolina for the tournament, which will be played at the course where he won the state amateur crown in 1972.

Horne is considered as having as good as chance as anyone, since he will be playing on his home course and since he has been playing excellent golf. In his last three tournaments, Horne has walked away with the Southern 500, the Berkeley Invitational, and the Snee Farm club championship titles.

In 1973, when the folks at Snee Farm and Dick Horne, specifically, came up with the idea for the first Rice Planters Amateur golf tournament, they literally had to beg players to participate.

Today, that's hard for Horne, himself, to believe, because in 1982 the Rice Planters has been forced to turn away players. Players with enviable personal records have found themselves closed out of a field that will include golfers from 22 states and four foreign countries when the 10th annual Rice Planters tees off Wednesday morning at Snee Farm.

The giant strides made by the still young tournament as it has sought to claim a spot on the nation's calendar as a major amateur golf event are obviously a source of pride for Horne, who continues in his role as tournament director this year.

"I honestly believe that the Rice Planters has emerged from a good golf tournament to one of the greatest amateur championships in the nation," Horne wrote in a brochure presented to the media during the recent Rice Planters press luncheon.

HORNE ELABORATED last week as he looked ahead to the 72-hole tournament which runs through Saturday.

"This is not just a golf tournament in Charleston anymore," he said. "The Rice Planters is now a tournament of national importance, bringing together the top amateur players from all over. And all of us involved with the tournament really appreciate the support that the media and the local business community has given us."

Heading the field for this year's Rice Planters is Don Burwell, a 6-5 giant from Miami Lakes, Fla. Burwell is a rarity in that he is defending his crown; most Rice Planters champions have turned professional before their year's reign has ended.

But if Burwell is to make a successful defense, he will have to fight off the stiffest competition ever assembled for the Rice Planters. The quality of the players is such that for the first time in the history of the tournament, the players were not listed by handicaps when the field was officially announced at the luncheon.

"This year, we didn't do that," Horne explained, "because everyone of them is a '0.' They're all scratch golfers."

Burwell, according to Horne, "has as good a chance of repeating as any defending champion. But I feel our field is much stronger, so therefore he's going to have to shoot much lower to win. The field this year is stronger than ever."

Dick Horne: Man behind Rice Planters

Twenty years ago Dick Horne of Mount Pleasant, a pretty fair amateur golfer in his own right, played in the Porter Cup in Niagara Falls, N.Y., and thought a similar tournament might fare well in the Lowcountry.

Little did he know that two decades later,

his inspiration, the Rice Planters Amateur golf tournament, would be one of the top five such competitions in the country.

But it didn't happen without a lot of work and a lot of help.

"I basically stole the idea from other people," Horne said Wednesday as he prepared to tee off in his

20th consecutive tournament at Snee Farm Country Club. "I asked for and got the Porter Cup's mailing list and used their guidelines and the rest of the credit goes to all the local people who helped make it work."

That first tournament in 1973 was played in October, as were the next two, and the field of 84 contained a few of the world's top amateur players. But mostly, it was filled with local talent.

The timing, however, made it tough for college players to participate and the tournament needed a boost to make its mark in the world of amateur golf.

Both of those problems were solved in 1975. First the club members approved moving the tournament to the Fourth of July weekend, and secondly, a young player named Andy Bean won the tournament that year.

"Can you hold on while I hit my tee shot," the voiced crackled over the cellular telephone.

With that, 57-year-old Dick Horne put down his phone and walked over to the 16th tee. After hitting it in the fairway, he returned to the business at hand, working any way he could to promote the upcoming 25th anniversary Mercedes-Benz Rice Planters Amateur which will be played Tuesday through Saturday at Snee Farm Country Club.

Horne is synonymous with the prestigious amateur tournament he founded a quarter century ago. You don't mention the Rice Planters without thinking of Dick Horne, and you can't mention Dick Horne without thinking about the Rice Planters.

Over the past 25 years, many of the best golfers in the world have made a week at Snee Farm Country Club part of their summer itinerary, players like Tom Lehman, Scott Hoch, Hal Sutton, Andy Bean, Duffy Waldorf, Michael Bradley, Brandel Chamblee, Allen Doyle and Stewart Cink, all past Rice Planters champions and current members of the PGA Tour.

But it wasn't always that way.

"I can remember walking down Broad Street, knocking on doors and passing out invitations, asking people if they wanted to play in the Rice Planters, the same way I sold insurance," said Horne, now retired from a successful insurance business that is carried on by his son and namesake, Richard, the chairman for this year's Rice Planters.

The idea for the Rice Planters was spawned in 1973 when Horne played in his first Porter Cup in Niagara Falls, N.Y. Horne thought the format for the tournament would go over well at Snee Farm. He convinced Porter Cup chairman Dick Harvey to give him the mailing list and then convinced the folks at Snee Farm to put on a tournament.

Horne wanted to call the tournament the Porter Cup of the South, but Ernie Chandler, who was chairman of the first tournament, came up with the idea to call it the Rice Planters, in honor of the old rice plantation that was once part of Snee Farm.

Horne said he didn't like the name initially, but it certainly has held its own in name recognition.

"The first year we let the members of the club play," he said. "The second year, we limited it to 5-handicap, and there were a lot of irate members.

"We tried to sell them on the idea of this becoming a spectator sport, and after a couple of years they accepted that."

The tournament was played in October the first three years, then moved to summer and held the week of the Fourth of July with a couple of exceptions.

Horne managed to recruit a few good players, and has continued to improve the field through the years by challenging those who participate to come back and bring better players. The tournament exchanges mailing lists with the U.S. Golf Association and major amateur tournaments.

"What really made the tournament was Andy Bean winning it in 1975," Horne said. "The next year the members started seeing him on television."

"What's made this succeed is the competition," Horne said. "These kids will play anywhere as long as they can play against each other."

Horne, a former Citadel golfer who has won the S.C. Open, two S.C. Match Play Championships, S.C. Mid-Amateur, been runner-up four times in the S.C. Amateur, won the Azalea, the City Amateur twice and Bermuda Amateur championship four times, has never won the Rice Planters. His closest call was in the second Rice Planters, when he lost in a playoff to Bill Harvey.

"I had a two-shot lead with two holes to go and I three-putted 17 and 18 to let Bill Harvey tie me," he said. "Then I knocked it in the lake on my second shot in sudden death."

THROUGH THE YEARS

1973

DAVID CANIPE 75-78-71-72 - 296

Canipe, 20 and a member of the Georgia golf team, was the reigning North Carolina Amateur champion when he won the inaugural Rice Planters, pulling away from veteran Bill Harvey on the final day to win by four shots. Bill Lewis was third, 14 shots behind Canipe. The tournament was played in mid-October. Canipe played the PGA Tour regularly from 1987 through 1992, recording two third-place finishes. He now lives in Florida where he teaches and plays the mini-tours.

1974 BILL HARVEY 79-69-69-78 - 295

Harvey, a venerable veteran who had won just about every major amateur title in North Carolina, beat Rice Planters founder Dick Horne on the first hole of sudden death. Horne three-putted the last two greens in regulation, then double bogeyed the playoff hole.

1975

ANDY BEAN 71-70-78-71 - 290

Bean, a two-time All-American from Florida, won by two shots over Bobby Gause and four over Gary Bennett. Bean broke away from a tie with Gause with a two-putt par on 17 and birdie on 18. Awaiting the awards ceremony, Bean was seated on the grass near the scoreboard when he was congratulated by Sen. Strom Thurmond, who told Bean to keep his seat. Bean took the senator's advice and shook hands while sitting down. Bean turned professional later that year and has played

the PGA Tour since, winning 11 times. His last two wins came in 1986 and he finished third on the PGA money list in 1978 and 1984. Bean has won more than \$3.3 million.

1976

BOB BYMAN 69-74-74-69 - 286

The Wake Forest standout won by six shots over Skeeter Heath, who like Byman went on to play the PGA Tour. Byman threw darts at the rain-soaked greens and shot 32 on the back nine. The field also included Harvey, Vance Heafner and Scott Hoch. Byman had quit school at Wake Forest the week before the Rice Planters to prepare for PGA qualifying school. He earned his card and won the Bay Hill Classic in 1979, playing the Tour regularly until 1983. He now teaches golf in Florida and has appeared as a guest instructor on The Golf Channel.

1977

BILL HARVEY 70-68-74-71 - 283

Harvey coasted to his second Rice Planters victory, a three-shot win over Vance Heafner, despite a three-putt on the final green. His total, a tournament record, was 12 better than when he won in 1974. The key shot was an approach to 2 ½ feet for birdie on the par-5 16th. Harvey, now 67, continues to play well as a senior. He is a member of the North Carolina Golf Hall of Fame. He lives in Jamestown, N.C.

1978

SCOTT HOCH 71-71-70-72 - 283

The tournament was moved to July to reach more college players and Hoch, a former Wake Forest standout, returned to claim a one-shot victory over Hal Sutton. Three shots back were Buddy Alexander, a future U.S. Amateur winner, and Larry Rinker. Hoch made two pars and a birdie from the sand during his last six holes. Hoch turned pro in 1979 and has won seven times on the PGA Tour, including once each of last three seasons. Has won more than \$6.5 million.

1979 HAL SUTTON 68-71-71-72 - 282

Sutton, runner-up the year before, blitzed the field and won by five shots over Rick Pearson and was seven shots ahead of defending champion Scott Hoch and Tom Reynolds. Fred Funk, another future PGA Tour player, also was in the field but finished well back. Sutton won the 1980 U.S. Amateur, turned pro late in 1981 and won seven times in his first five years, including the '83 PGA Championship. He led the Tour in earnings in 1983, experienced a big slump in 1992 and '93, but has revived his game and added another win in 1995. He has won almost \$5 million.

1980

RICK PEARSON 66-70-73-68 - 288

Pearson, the reigning Florida Amateur champion, beat Hal Sutton's year-old record for low score in the Rice Planters with a four-shot win over Tim Norris. A birdie on the par-5 second hole allowed Pearson to break away from a field that included Mark O'Meara, Lee Rinker, Joey Sindelar, Fred Funk, Nathaniel Crosby and Jack Nicklaus II. Pearson turned pro later that year. His best year ever on the PGA Tour was 1988, when he finished 142nd on the money list and posted a T-8 in the Deposit Guaranty Golf Classic. He now works as an editor for PGA Tour Productions and is a non-exempt member of the Nike Tour.

1981

DON BURWELL 75-72-71-67 - 285

Burwell became the second straight Florida golfer to win the Rice Planters, passing 12 players with a final-round 67 that included an eagle-3 on the 610-yard fifth hole. The 6-6, 240-pound Burwell hit only 40 of 72 greens in regulation. He finished a shot ahead of 15-year-old Tim Fieldhouse. Other top players in the field included Tom Lehman, Lee Rinker, Steve Jones and Tommy Armour III. Burwell, who attended the University of Houston and played on an NCAA Championship team that included Steve Elkington and Billy Ray Brown. He dropped out of school before graduating and returned to Florida.

1982

TOM LEHMAN 72-70-68-73 - 283

A jittery Lehman, who had finished second in two major amateur tournaments leading up to the Rice Planters, recorded his most significant amateur victory, beating North Carolina's Billy Wilford and LSU's Tommy Moore, by two shots. Before almost every shot, Lehman would waggle the club at least 20 times before swinging. Lehman turned professional later that year, earned and lost his PGA Tour the next three years, then played overseas and on the mini-tours before regaining his playing status in 1992. His career blossomed and last season he was the PGA Tour's player of the year, No. 1 money winner and British Open champion.

1983

BRANDEL CHAMBLEE 72-70-68-69 - 279

Chamblee out-dued Scott Verplank in a battle of Texans. Chamblee birdied the 16th hole to tie Verplank, birdied the par-3 17th to move ahead and two-putted the last hole where Verplank narrowly missed a 20-foot birdie try. Josh Mondry and Tommy Moore tied for third. Other notables in the field included John Inman, Davis Love III, Webb Heintzelman and Nathaniel Crosby. Chamblee, an All-American in 1982, '83 and '84, has been through qualifying school successfully four times. His best PGA Tour finish was a T-2 in the 1996 BellSouth Classic and he won the 1990 Nike New England Classic.

1984

GREG SWEATT 71-70-74-68 - 283

Sweatt, of Rock Hill and the University of South Carolina, became the first golfer from the Palmetto State to win the Rice Planters, beating John Inman, John Macfie, Bruce Soulsby, Stan Utley and Fred Dupre by three shots. Sweatt missed only one green and hit every fairway in the final round. He birdied two of his last three holes to pull away from the field. Since turning professional, Sweatt has been playing mini-tours, including a few Nike events. He qualified for this year's U.S. Open but missed the cut.

1985

DUFFY WALDORF 67-64-71-73 - 275

Waldorf was 13-under after two rounds and looked to be uncatchable, but Oklahoma State's Brian Watts did so on the final day, shooting 66 and making up five shots on the last five holes. Waldorf, a UCLA graduate and the 1985 college player of the year, shot a course record 64 in the second round. Other top players in the tournament included Karl Zoller, Louis Brown, Jeff Maggert, Scott Gump and Hugh Royer III. Waldorf played on the 1985 Walker Cup team, then turned professional that fall. He went through qualifying school four times and won the 1995 LaCantera Texas Open. Waldorf has won almost \$3 million in 10 years.

1986

MICHAEL BRADLEY 67-69-68-74 - 278

The Oklahoma State star had a 10-shot lead going into the final round and got to 15-under for the tournament with a 33 on the front nine. But Bradley lost his concentration on the back nine, making four bogeys and a double bogey to win by "only" eight shots over Robert McCardle. The tournament had been moved to late August. Bradley turned professional in 1988 but didn't qualify for the PGA Tour until 1993. He scored his first victory in 1996, at the Buick Challenge, and finished 20th on the money list. He won on the Canadian PGA Tour in 1989 and '90.

1987

NACHO GERVAS 71-68-71-69 - 279

Gervas, a native of Spain who attended Georgia Tech, came back from a rain-delay to overtake Jim Hagstrom of Slippery Rock and Georgia's Matt Peterson and win by two shots. Gervas took the lead for good with a birdie on the 12th hole. The tournament dates were switched once again and played in late June. Included in the field were Tommy Tolles and defending champion Michael Bradley. After graduating from Georgia Tech, Gervas turned professional and plays in Spain. He also does commentary for Spanish television and has covered the Masters.

1988

ALLEN DOYLE 69-68-71-68 - 276

At age 39, Doyle, a former college hockey player who ran a driving range in LaGrange, Ga., became

the oldest Rice Planters champion since Bill Harvey. Doyle had to hold off the University of Georgia's Matt Peterson, the Carolinas Amateur champion, who finished two shots back after bogeying the 17th hole. Afterward, it was announced that the tournament was returning to its traditional Fourth of July dates for the following year.

1989

REX KURAMOTO 73-69-70-67 - 279

Japan's Kuramoto, who played collegiately at East Tennessee State, beat two-time U.S. Amateur champion Jay Sigel on the first hole of sudden death. Frank Ford III of Charleston finished third, three shots back. Sigel three-putt for a par on the 16th hole while Kuramoto birdied to close within a shot of Sigel, then Sigel bogeyed 17 to set up the playoff. After graduating, Kuramoto returned to Japan and his playing the Japanese PGA Tour.

1990

ALLEN DOYLE 69-71-68-70 - 278

Doyle, the 1988 Rice Planters winner and a member of the 1989 Walker Cup team, beat another University of Georgia star, Franklin Langham, by two

shots to become only the second two-time Rice Planters champ. Doyle's lead was never less than four shots on the back nine until he bogeyed 17 and Langham birdied.

1991

FRANKLIN LANGHAM 71-68-66-72 - 277

Langham got his revenge over Allen Doyle, reversing the previous year's finish. Doyle fired a final-round 68 and tied with Ray Franz Jr. for second. The field included three U.S. Mid-Amateur champions, Jay Sigel, Jim Stuart and Danny Yates. Langham turned pro later that year after playing on the Walker Cup team. He has been playing the mini-tours and the Nike Tour.

1992

BRIAN GAY 69-70-69-69 - 277

Gay, a junior at Florida, birdied three of the first five holes and then held off Allen Doyle, who finished second for the second straight year. Future PGA Tour players Tom Scherrer and Stewart Cink along with Clemson's Danny Ellis tied for third. Gay opened the door for Doyle when he bogeyed 17, but Doyle missed a 12-footer for birdie on the final hole. Gay is now playing the mini-tours in Florida.

1993

STEWART CINK 72-70-71-63 - 276

Cink, on his honeymoon, provided plenty of Fourth of July fireworks with his final-round 63. Unfortunately, few were around to witness the course-record effort since he started well back in the pack. Cink beat David Howser by a shot and was two strokes ahead of defending champion Brian Gay. Robert Damron, a leading contender for PGA rookie of the year honors this season, tied for fifth. Howser, a senior at Arizona, had to think back to a 2-stroke penalty he incurred during the second round when he hit the sand while taking a practice swing. The field also included Tim Herron and Trip Kuehne. Cink turned professional in 1995 and was the 1996 Nike Tour player of the year with three wins and a record \$251,699, moving him to the PGA Tour this season.

1994

ALLEN DOYLE 70-67-67-69 - 273

Doyle, 46, became the tournament's first three-time champion as he and defending champion Stewart Cink distanced themselves from the field. Doyle's 3-under-par final round gave him a one-shot victory and helped prove to him that he was making the right decision by turning professional the next year. He won five events that summer, adding wins in the Porter Cup, Sunnehanna, Cardinal and Dogwood. Doyle had planned to play mini-tours with an eye on a Senior Tour career, but he won the 1995 Nike Mississippi Gulf Coast Classic to earn exempt status, then won two more events and gained a spot on the PGA Tour. As the Tour's oldest rookie, Doyle finished 140th on the money list last year.

1995

TODD ORMSBY 65-70-71-69 - 275

The N.C. State graduate became the event's first wire-to-wire winner, shooting a final-round 69 to beat Frank Ford III by three shots and Trip Kuehne and Mike Bright by four shots. Ormsby's biggest previous win was in the Palmetto Intercollegiate 2 ½ months earlier at nearby Charleston National. Ormsby birdied three of his first four holes and had a five-shot lead with 11 holes left. Ormsby has since turned professional and is playing mini-tours throughout the Southeast.

1996

MICHAEL BOYD 70-68-71 - 209

Boyd, a rising junior at Tulsa, won the first rain-shortened Rice Planters with a playoff victory over Wake Forest's Justin Roof and Oklahoma State's Landry Mahan. Boyd had to sink a 40-foot birdie try on the final hole of regulation to join the playoff, then birdied the second extra hole. Boyd will be returning to defend. Already this summer, he has won the Monroe (N.Y.) Invitational and finished seventh in the Sunnehanna.

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Drew Hackett birdied four of his first nine holes Friday and built a four-shot lead midway through the final round of the 49th annual Rice Planters Amateur golf tournament at Snee Farm Country Club. But it was a par on the 11th hole that gave the UNC Wilmington rising junior the confidence to go out and score his first amateur victory.

"Honestly, the 11th hole (a 203-yard par-3) was huge for me. I didn't have a tough time making pars today. I was hitting greens. But I missed the green on 11 and didn't hit a good chip," Hackett said. "My playing partners had just birdied the hole before, so I knew they were coming for me. I ended up making that 6-footer for par. I felt like once I got that to drop, I just needed to keep the putter hot, and I ended up birdieing two holes coming in and sealing the deal."

Hackett finished with a bogey-free 6-under-par 66 in the final round and a 12-under total of 204, three shots better than UNC Wilmington teammate Lansdon Robbins and Furman's Mac Scott. Robbins had a final-round 67, while Scott closed with a 68.

Austin Fulton of Mississippi State, who won the 2019 Rice Planters, posted the day's best round, a 7-under 65, and finished fourth at 208.

Hackett distanced himself from the field with birdies on 2, 3, 6 and 7 for a front-nine 32, and after the par save at 11, he birdied 13 and 15 coming in.

"This feels really good. It's my first-ever amateur win," Hackett said. "Coming down the stretch, it was the first time I really had serious nerves. It was really nice to hit the ball clean. I hit the ball great all day and it felt good off the face every single time. It was nice hitting it and looking up and thinking 'OK. You're still in play.' I was not having any problems. It was really, really awesome."

Hackett said he didn't have any idea how big his lead was but knew if he went low and got to 11-under or 12-under for the tournament, there probably wasn't going to be anyone other than the players in his group who could catch him.

"To have my name on that trophy with names like Brooks Koepka (four-time major champion and 2009 Rice Planters winner) and Tom Lehman (1982 Rice Planters winner and 1996 British Open winner), who would've thunk it," said Hackett, who added that he looks forward to returning to the Rice Planters in 2022. "A year ago if you had told me I would win this, I would have laughed in your face. It just takes a lot of work, a lot of dedication and time. And then, obviously, getting hot at the right time. Winning this tournament is a big deal for me. It definitely jump starts my career."
